#### September has been a busy month for CPN students!

Expanded Learning Time (ELT) launched right after Labor Day, co-sponsored by CPN and Charleston County School District's (CCSD) Office of Expanded Learning and Community Education, to offer 500 students robust afterschool programming at Chicora, Mary Ford and Sanders-Clyde schools. We received promising results from CCSD's data analysis of our 2015-16 ELT programs, that helps us hone our focus on academic remediation during the 2016-17 programming year. Finally, thanks to a generous gift from Blackbaud, 50 CPN students attended the September 24th Charleston Symphony Orchestra Cirque De La Symphonie Family Concert at the Gaillard Center. Before the performance, students participated in a "petting zoo" where they handled classical instruments under the guidance of

professional musicians. Our students have the first month of school under their belt, and we look forward to seeing them grow over the next eight!

## **CPN Students Show Gains in Math in ELT Data Outcomes**


Academic achievement is at the forefront of CPN's mission to ensure our studets are on track for success. One way CPN is ensuring students have the opportunity to be successful academically is through Expanded Learning Time (ELT). Serving 400+ students at 3 schools last year, we are happy to report that CCSD's analysis of our daily afterschool program data indicates that the majority of students participating in ELT programs: 1) improved their performance in



mathematics, 2) experienced less "out of school suspensions", and 3) improved their school day attendance, as compared to their peers not participating in ELT. In addition, CPN partnered with Reading Partners in a pilot program where 47 K-2nd grade ELT students at Sanders-Clyde received an additional 2 hours per week with a volunteer reading tutor during the 2015-16 afterschool program. Results from this pilot program indicate growth in reading and literacy levels that surpassed national norms by upwards of 25%. We look to expand this pilot and achieve even greater results this year!

### **Expanded Learning Time Programs in Full Swing**

The 2016-17 Expanded Learning Time (ELT) programs are underway! Nearly 500 students have enrolled at Chicora, Mary Ford, and Sanders-Clyde in afterschool programs where they receive academic supports, participate in extracurricular enrichment, and receive dinner each weekday after school. Many thanks to our amazing site coordinators who keep ELT a well-oiled machine that runs smoothly and effectively.
