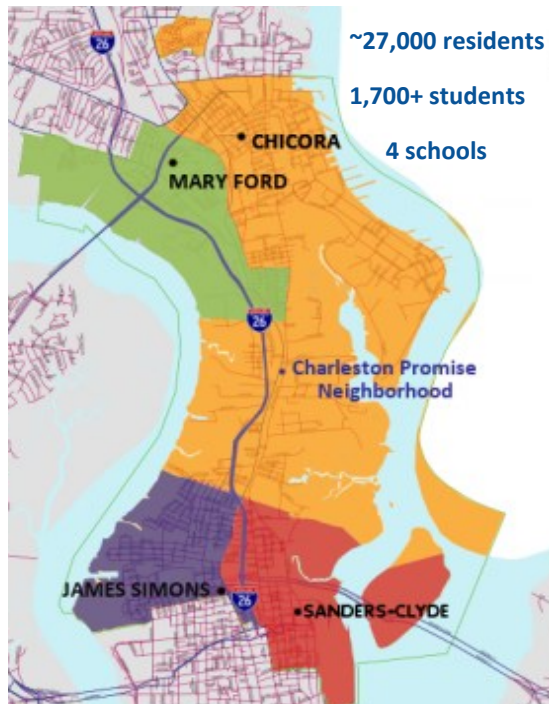




2015-2016 Stakeholder Report

The 2015-16 school year marked Charleston Promise Neighborhood's (CPN) fifth year of working with students and families in our 5.6 square mile footprint. This report shares the encouraging results of our work in the areas of education, healthcare, and parent and community engagement.

Key partners in delivering this quality and depth of programming include Charleston County School District's (CCSD) Office of Expanded Learning, CCSD's Elementary Learning Community, the Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC), Reading Partners, WINGS for Kids, Communities in Schools, and Metanoia.

Other critical contributors to our success include donors, extracurricular enrichment providers, principals, teachers, nurses, community leaders — and most importantly — parents!

Expanded Learning Time

CPN's primary goal is to provide supports to students that help drive academic achievement.

Expanded Learning Time (ELT) Encompasses

- daily afterschool programs
- summer programs
- field experiences for each student

In 2015-16, CPN invested in quality afterschool and summer programs.

Research by the Afterschool Alliance indicates that by the time students living in poverty reach middle school, they will have missed out on nearly 6,000 hours, or five years, of lost learning through extracurricular enrichment opportunities.

Unfortunately, time to learn is a resource that is unequally distributed across socio-economic groups and has serious impacts on our least advantaged. CPN offers additional learning opportunities for our students, including our ELT afterschool programs, where students receive an additional 2.5 hours of structured learning time each weekday.

Quality Assurance

To ensure that we are offering quality programs, we work with The Weikart Center for Quality Youth Programming. The Weikart Center's research-based improvement system helps afterschool programs set meaningful improvement goals, enact new practices, and create powerful developmental environments for youth.

Social-Emotional Growth

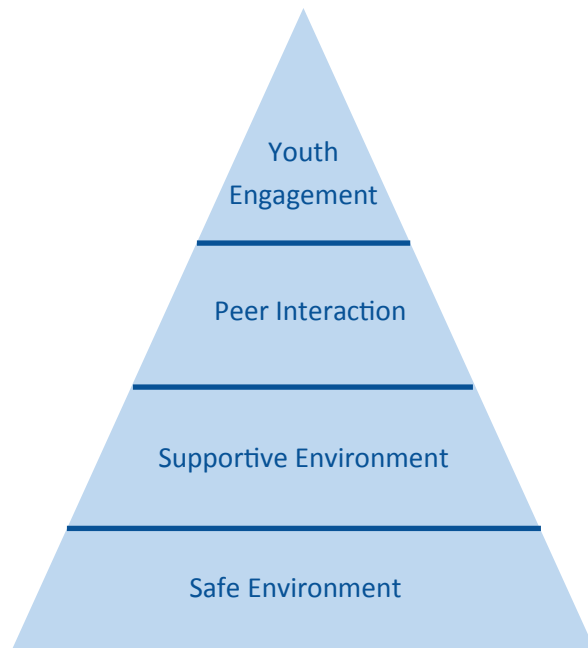
Research indicates that social-emotional growth is an important aspect of quality afterschool programs. CPN measures academic as well as social-emotional outcomes. Using the Devereux Student Strengths Assessment (DESSA) tool, we found that our students made strides in goal-directed behavior, decision-making, and self-awareness skills.

Beyond the growth in the academic and social-emotional development arena, ELT gives students opportunities to explore and discover their passions through extracurricular activities that enrich their learning experiences.

Expanded Learning Time

Daily Afterschool Program Overview

- reduces the achievement gap
- pre-K through 8th grade students
- 400 students across 3 schools
- 3 activity sessions each day
 - 1 hour of academic support/intervention (math and literacy focus)
 - 1 hour of extracurricular enrichment
 - dinner

Daily Afterschool Program Results

- On average, students received 290 hours of additional learning time through afterschool
- Improved performance in mathematics
- Improved performance in reading
- experienced less “out of school suspensions”
- improved their school-day attendance

Summer Program Overview

- increase or maintain reading levels
- Kindergarten through 5th grade
- 71 students
- small group reading intervention
- extracurricular enrichment

Summer Program Results

- 75% of students reading at or above grade level
- 20% of students reading above grade level
- 100% of students maintained or gained literacy skills
- 1st graders averaged a 6 point improvement on the Reading Recovery assessment

2015-16 ELT Reading Pilot at Sanders-Clyde

CPN contracted with Reading Partners to provide 2 additional hours of reading tutoring per week to 47 K-2nd grade students during the afterschool program at Sanders-Clyde.

At the conclusion of the pilot, students were evaluated using the nationally normed STAR Early Literacy Reading Test, to assess their literacy skills in preparation for reading.

Results

- **100%** of Kindergarten participants demonstrated mastery of Visual Discrimination, Alphabetic Principle, and Word Concepts.
- **86%** of 1st grade participants demonstrated mastery of all concepts listed above as well as Phonemic Awareness, and Phonics.
- **91%** of 2nd grade participants demonstrated mastery of all concepts listed above as well as Vocabulary, Sentence Level Comprehension, and Paragraph Levels Comprehension.

KidsWell School Based Health Clinics (SBHCs), established in CPN's four Neighborhood schools in 2011, are a joint venture between CPN and the Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC). In 2014 we established a fifth KidsWell clinic at Burns Elementary in North Charleston, at the request of CCSD.

In 2015-16, we increased enrollment to 1,300 students, focused on students with chronic ailments, and supported health screenings for visual, dental, and auditory issues.

TeleMental Health services were added to the KidsWell suite of offerings during the 2015-16 school year, increasing student access to pediatric care. Teachers continue to refer students, and more parents are enrolling their children as they value the convenience and quality of care their child has received.

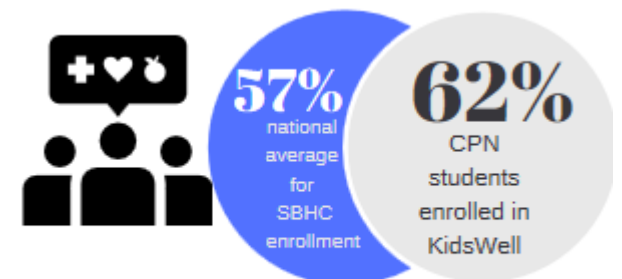

Parent and Community Engagement

CPN continues to have a laser-focus on engaging residents and increasing their voices in community change, and in supporting parents' engagement in their children's schools. Our efforts in community and parent engagement focus on three areas:

Family Enrichment Nights

- students and families get hands-on experiences in STEM, health, the arts, and more
- strengthens the family unit and creates opportunities for team problem-solving
- fosters curiosity, creativity and persistence

YouthPromise

- engages 6th-8th grade students in weekly sessions focused on effective communication, etiquette, leadership and citizenship
- YouthPromise Girlz provides extra support and guidance to young ladies at Sanders-Clyde during challenging middle school years

Community Engagement Council (CEC)

- monthly meetings where residents discuss Neighborhood issues, plan community events and help connect community challenges with solutions
- CPN is the fiscal agent for Coastal Community Foundation's Rosemont Neighborhood Endowment, and recently connected the Rosemont neighborhood with a local tech company that will provide residents with computers and host weekly computer coding labs for students residing in Rosemont

Financial Snapshot



CPN's mission is to ensure our Neighborhood is a place where residents are engaged and every child is on track to graduate high school with the abilities necessary to succeed in college, the military or the workforce.

Since our inception in 2010, CPN has continued to secure funding and volunteer resources necessary to deliver innovative and transformative programming in our Neighborhood schools. Our founding partners, the Cities of Charleston and North Charleston, Charleston County and Charleston County School District, have provided CPN with seed funding for the first six years of our operations, but we know they cannot sustain significant levels of support over the long term. For this reason, CPN has engaged local corporations, private foundations and individuals who share our passion for providing access and opportunities to children and families who seek it.

In 2015-16 we launched an exciting new family engagement initiative to commemorate the 100th anniversary of our top corporate sponsor, Boeing South Carolina, who hosted a Family Science Night series for CPN families to engage in project-based STEM learning. Our corporate supporters have invested cash resources, volunteer manpower, and in kind support to enable program delivery. We seek to grow the number of volunteers that support our work through events like the Day of Caring and CPN's Community Olympics, as well as provide regular volunteer engagement opportunities in CPN's school-based programs.

Additionally, support from individual investors has steadily grown year over year, and CPN has consistently been a leading securer of Lowcountry Giving Day support over the past three years. Thanks to our generous Five Year Anniversary Challenge Fund donor, Anita Zucker, we secured 65 new donors and grew individual donor support for CPN by 14% in 2015-16. Additionally, our growth in individual giving has steadily increased to 58% over the past 5 years.

CPN continues to build relationships with national foundations, federal and state funders, as well as new corporations and individuals as we plan for long-term sustainability of our mission to lift our Neighborhood over the course of a generation.
